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Eli Kelling on Google Maps, Calendar at Gen'l Meeting

Vice-President Gary Kohler called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. WAUC welcomed new member, Mr. John Schwarzmeyer, a friend of Gary, who enjoys playing computer games. And Ms. Josta Renz was with us as a guest. Gary announced that WAUC recently lost another member, Sister Terry Patterson of Clement Manor. Sister Terry has no close family so there is no sympathy card for members to sign. Marcia Zientek pointed out that thanks to Sister Terry, WAUC is now able to use the meeting rooms at Clement Manor. Louise Dahms said that Sister Terry had a very good sense of humor because she appreciated the email jokes that were sent to her by Louise.

Bill Gierach gave the Treasurer's Report, details of which are on page (7), and projected the WAUC Treasury spreadsheet while doing so. Gary asked if everyone was receiving their emails with WAUCtalk and the WAUC Bulletin and for now, everyone is up to date. WAUCtalk Editor, Julia Rice, was present earlier and had to leave but her list of APCUG articles was being passed around. Members were asked to initial the articles they most wanted to appear in WAUCtalk. Gary reminded everyone that the coffee being served at the meeting is decaffeinated.

Richard Durand was called upon to describe the raffle prizes available at tonight's drawing. Gary introduced the new WAUC Webmaster and Boardwauc Moderator, Mr. Don Skarda, who was asked to stand and was then welcomed by the members. Gary announced the preliminary plans for the upcoming WAUC Holiday party to be held at the General Meeting in December. A sign-up sheet for each member to bring a dish to pass was available on the registration table at the back. Members were asked if they would like the club to order sliced ham and turkey or continue to have roast beef and turkey: the consensus was for roast beef and turkey. The upcoming presentations were reviewed. Mr. Eli Kelling will be speaking this evening on the topic of Google services and will be present again at the November meeting to continue, and in December, WAUC will hold its Holiday party. Members were reminded that the annual

election of WAUC officers will take place next month. Gary and the current officers are running for office again but other members were welcomed and encouraged to run as well.

The WAUC schedule of events for October was reviewed. After tonight's meeting, there will be an informal get-together as usual, at the Wendy's on 43rd and Lincoln. The Mac SIG was canceled last month but is scheduled again for October 12th. Last month, the Tutorial SIG continued with its program about Windows 10 and learned about Control Panel, the Search function, Updates, Windows Firewall and Defender, and where to find the Snippet tool. The Tutorial SIG will meet again on October 13th.

The WAUC Lunch will be held again at Old Country Buffet, 1:00 PM, on October 17th. At last month's Q & A SIG, many topics were addressed, but the most interesting was hearing from Marcia Zientek, who had heard from Terry how to deal with "robocalls." Marcia tried going into the phone settings of Timer Warner but so far has not been able to find the right selections for this. Peter Leitner asked why he has to restart his computer every time the user password field is blank. Our speaker, Eli Kelling, explained that one can use the command "Ctrl-Alt" instead of restarting and then the settings can be changed to select "auto start" so that one does not have to enter the password every time. The Q & A SIG will meet again on October 20th.

After its summer hiatus, the Investment SIG met again September 28th at Panera Bread. The attendees agreed that for the future, the SIG will return to meeting at the Wendy's, 7707 W. Layton, because it is less busy and less noisy. The next Investment SIG will be on October 26th.



The Tablet SIG met last month on September 29th. At that time, the attendees decided to meet on November 10th, the same date as the Tutorial SIG, because its normal meeting date will fall on Thanksgiving. Per Louise Dahms, the Mac SIG for November will also be held on this same date, instead of its normal date a day earlier, the 9th. For October, the Tablet SIG will meet again on October 29th.

Bill described the contents of the CD of the Month for October. There are still has some WAUC sweatshirts for sale. Bill then talked about some of the computer problems he had helped members with, including cleaning up and organizing files, setting up printers, adding RAM, and replacing a hard drive on his own machine. In the discussion of computer issues, Ed Marquard told about how it is possible to call the Internet provider, Time Warner, at 611, and to have all business calls blocked. Gary Kohler talked about the progress he is making on writing his own operating system. Louise Dahms said that at the last Tablet SIG members went over some improvements made in the new iPad operating system that are really worthwhile. Richard Durand said his Avast anti-virus program is running really slow on his new Windows 10 tablet and he was advised to turn off his screen saver. Phil Walker said that he is receiving rampant spam emails on his Verizon smart phone. As we went into our mid-meeting break, Gary reminded everyone to get some coffee and goodies, to look over what is offered on the free table, and to see Bill for CDs of the Month, WAUC sweatshirts, raffle tickets, and to update their contact information. Jim Hempel reminded everyone to sign up to bring a dish to pass at the December Holiday party.

After the break, and after the drawing for the raffle prize, Gary introduced the speaker for the evening, Mr. Eli Kelling, who spoke on Google

services. He does business support, systems and network administration, and is currently a contractor for Kohl's Department Stores. He began with Google Docs, and showed how Google gives documents the file name of the beginning of the text, so the file name does not have to be entered all over again. He devoted considerable time to describing Google Maps. Not only does Google offer comprehensive newly updated maps, but it will open maps to the location one where one's Internet provider's headquarter are located. When giving directions, Google Maps will estimate the travel time and even re-route paths to avoid known traffic and construction slow-downs, and it indicates when traffic lights are red. Google Calendar offers the most convenient times available for meetings, appointments, etc., for users who set up their calendars for sharing. He showed how users can set up the sharing of their files and folders and offered the tip to just share folders, because it saves a lot of time in identifying each file for this. There were many other Google features described that there just is not space to include. The one thing to take away from this presentation, is that though Google gathers a lot of information from those using all these services, but for the most part, this is nothing to be concerned about. Google uses information to help its users and to improve its services, not for any harmful and negative purposes. Some time was devoted to answering questions from the members and the meeting adjourned at about 9:05 PM. Removing Stuff, Powering Up, Uses of Tablets

Those attending this evening included Janice Rochwerger, Lucille Stahl, Christine Harris, Bob and Terry Harvey, Don Gardner, Julia Rice, Pat Koehler, and Regine Barry.

To remove an app, long press the app icon. A trashcan will appear at the top of the page. Tap the trash icon and the app will be removed. (On Kindle Fire, REMOVE FROM DEVICE appears.)

To remove the lock screen from a Samsung tablet, go to SETTINGS (tap the gear icon), under PERSONAL, tap LOCK SCREEN and remove the check mark beside LOCK.

To remove pictures from the Kindle Fire, tap the picture, then tap the TRASH CAN at the top of the screen, then tap DELETE.

On the Kindle Fire, the microphone is the tiny hole by the on/off switch.

On the Kindle device the screen will rotate. On the Kindle app the screen will not rotate.

Jim brought a brick-style portable charger/external battery pack. A battery's capacity is expressed in terms of milliamp hours, or mAh. As you can imagine, larger devices, like tablets, have much higher-capacity batteries built in because they often draw

more power. Most portable battery charger manufacturers will state how many amps they can deliver. It's usually .5A, 1A, or 2A. Amperage tells you how quickly a battery pack can charge up your device. More is faster. Be sure to check if it comes with a cord or if you have to purchase that separately.

Jim shared with us a little trick that works well for him and we all agreed it would be very helpful. Take a craft pen and make a tiny dot on your device at the connection point. Also, put another tiny dot on the top side of the charging cable as indicated in the picture. No more turning things in all directions.



Jim always brings his television and tonight he also brought his Roku stick. He streams movies and watches television through his Roku.

If you would like to see something magnified just take a picture of it with your device and with your fingers spread it open.

Q & A: How to Dump AOL

Those attending included Jim Hempel, Marcia Zientek, Dolores Dettmann, Bill Gierach, Bob and Terry Harvey, Richard Durand, Don Skarda, Pat Koehler, and Phil Walker.

Dolores asked a question for her daughter. Her daughter is getting AOL mail through her Gmail account and no longer wants anything from AOL. How can she get rid of AOL? In Gmail, go to SETTINGS, ACCOUNT PREFERENCES. Go to AOL, logon (she might see CLOSE ACCOUNT INFORMATION right there), MANAGE MY SUBSCRIPTION, CANCEL YOUR FREE AOL ACCOUNT, CANCEL AOL.

How do you copy a CD to a jump drive? Insert CD in drive, a box appears on the screen, click on OPEN LIKE A FILE. The CD will usually be in the D: drive. Insert jump drive. HIGHLIGHT WHAT'S ON THE SCREEN, DRAG AND DROP IT ONTO THE JUMP DRIVE ICON. Or, if you have other things on the jump drive you might want to create a new folder and put everything from the CD into the folder. To create a new folder on the jump drive, RIGHT CLICK ON JUMP DRIVE ICON, CLICK ON NEW FOLDER. To rename the NEW FOLDER, you will notice the words NEW FOLDER are highlighted. Tap your BACKSPACE key then type the new name. Now DRAG AND DROP the contents of the CD to the new folder on the jump drive.

Back to Basics

Changing to another Email Service

Almost all computer users use email – and you are one of them, right? Have you ever had to change your email address or change to another email provider? Recently here in Florida (and I hear in Texas and California as well) our internet provider Verizon has been taken over by Frontier. As a result of this, EVERYONE had to change from Verizon to AOL for their email. Fortunately their Verizon email address will continue to be accepted by AOL (for now).

The purpose of this article is to help you understand what steps are needed to change to another email. I do recommend Gmail because it comes with several other tools provided by Google and you most likely will never have to change to another email address.

Your first task is to go to the website and establish a new email account -- that is get your new email address and password. Please write it down and do not lose it! Once you have your new email ID your major concerns are forwarding your old emails to your new email address, getting your address book (or contact list) to your new email and to notify everyone of your new address.

Some emails (such as Gmail) may ask you what your other email address is and automatically bring your contact list and forward any emails from your old address to your new address. They want your email business. But if your address book is not copied over for you then you will have to do it yourself. By all means "ask Google" how to do it. For example, ask Google "How do I get my AOL address book to my Gmail contacts?"

What you will most likely have to do is to create a file of your address book by "exporting" it and giving it a file

name, then copying that file by "importing" it into your new email. After you do this you need to examine your entire address book, name by name, to see that all the data was copied correctly. You will probably have some editing to do to straighten things out. For example, some phone numbers may not have been copied over or a nickname may have been placed as the last name, etc.

Next it is helpful to have all your old email "forwarded" to your new email address. This way you do not have to hurry to notify everyone on your list that you have a new email. If this is not possible, you may have to go into your old email and actually forward those important emails to your new email. From now on, only use your new email address.

Finally, send a nice email to everyone telling them your new email address. It also is essential that you read the "help" or "options" for your new email so that you are aware of how to create new email folders, sort your emails, find emails, etc.

Although every email can do these basic functions, how it is done may be different on different emails. And if you are converting to Gmail, be sure to check out the many apps that are available to you with your Gmail account ID. Now you are ready to enjoy using your new email.

One word of caution -- what if you have used your email address to establish accounts with various on-line businesses or services? Movie channels, banking, club memberships, etc. may be using your OLD email address as your account ID. Unfortunately, all of these accounts must be changed to your new email ID. This may entail you having to enter all new passwords for all these accounts as well. This can be a real pain if you have many accounts, but there is really no other way around this, sorry. Be sure to write down ALL your IDs and passwords for EVERY service or app which requires an account.

Good luck and please don't forget to Ask Google anything about your email. You will find very helpful instructions and videos to guide you. Now here's hoping that you will never have to change your email address again!

Some Thoughts on WAUC

From what I have heard about other local computer clubs, WAUC might be the most active of all the computer clubs in town. There's no doubt that it offers a lot of social events and SIGs (special interest groups) and just about everything one could ask for in a General Meeting. Admittedly, it's all more than anyone can keep up with. And with such an embarrassment of riches, it's very easy to skip a SIG or meeting for no other reason than "I'm just not interested in that" or "I just don't feel like it."

How to Use the CD of the Month

How does one use the **CDOM** and what is it?

To use the **CD** of the **Month**, insert the CD into your CD drive. It may take a few seconds for the CD drive to read it. A box will appear on your screen with a few choices on it.

Chose **AUTORUN.EXE**. Some computers are set to automatically read the CD. Either way, a menu appears with categories. The categories are usually Documents, Web Tools, Utilities, Images and Video Tools, and Security. I always click on **DOCUMENTS** first so I can read a short synopsis of each program. Click on any of the categories and more choices will appear.

If you've clicked on a category and it isn't what you want, just click on **MAIN MENU** to take you back to the beginning. To **INSTALL A PROGRAM**, **CLICK ON THE PROGRAM ON THE MENU**, a box will come up asking if you're sure you want to make changes to your system. Answer **YES**. In a few seconds the program will install itself. It will put an icon on your desktop.

To use the program, just click on it from your desktop. I buy one every month.

Bill works hard to select programs for us and does a great job. These CDOMs have saved me more then once. To purchase a CDOM, see Bill Gierach. The cost is \$5.
