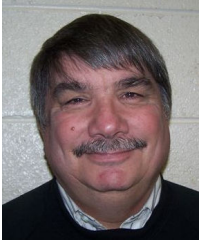

Investment Tracking SIG—Trying Out VectorVest



The WAUC Investment SIG was held again on September 28th, 2011 and was attended by WAUC members Richard Durand, Don Gardner, and Dale Voit. A little

later, we were joined by Richard's guest, Mr. Mike Neumann of Milwaukee.

We began the SIG discussing the loss of our fellow WAUC investor, Mr. Glen Ehnert. Just earlier this year, Glen gave a presentation at the SIG on trading stock options. Dale brought us up to date on former WAUC member and fellow investor, Mr. Harold Bauer, who is now experiencing ill health. Dale also said he had just that day attended the funeral of Harold Bauer's brother and saw Harold there.

A frequent attendee of the WAUC

Investment SIG, Mr. Rex Nielson, had just gone into the hospital for a hip replacement procedure and we wish him well. The Investment SIG has been together a good number of years and we are concerned about each other.

Once logged on to the INet, we went to our reliable investment website, <http://www.stockmaven.com/> and checked the charts and technical indicators of some market indexes. We checked the S&P 500, SPY, the Dow Jones, DIA, the NASDAQ, QQQ, and the CBOE Volatility index, VIX.

Then we went to our virtual account for the Investment SIG at Investopedia, <http://www.investopedia.com/>, and placed an order for 1,000 shares of a stock Dale found, "Advanced Battery Technologies," ABAT. We also placed an order for 100 shares of SPY, the S&P 500 index fund. Our other purchases from earlier this

year are all doing poorly, what with the recent drop in the market. But that's one of the things a virtual account is for—to show what can happen without risking actual money.

The rest of the SIG was devoted to watching an investment video disk about VectorVest, an online stock analysis, training, and portfolio management system. Over the years we have all received periodic advertising from VectorVest in the mail, and we have investigated it several times at the Investment SIG. Their program looks interesting but, since it is very expensive, none of us have signed up.

Recently, Richard was able to buy a set of VectorVest training videos at a flea market for only \$5.00 with the idea that a lot about investing can be learned by watching them without subscribing to the full program. The videos appear to be dated from late

2007, just before the market turmoil of recent years, which is something to be aware of.

We watched the first video in a set of about ten slides; in format, it consists of a series of "PowerPoint" slides with spreadsheet info with the recorded narration of Dr. Bart DiLiddo, the VectorVest founder. Dr. DiLiddo explains that by education he is actually a chemical engineer, and that he developed his unique investment research methods decades ago when the traditional methods of the investment industry didn't work for him. Once the Internet came along he was able to set up VectorVest online and the rest is history. Its website is <http://www.vectorvest.com/>.

The video gives an explanation of the VectorVest method of stock

analysis using common published data for each stock such as its current price, the P/E or price/earnings ratio, the growth rate, and the earnings per share. The viewer is led, step by step, to the use of data values combined with each other, such as the value for growth over P/E. It all leads to a new calculation of a stock's proper value, which is 100 x (earnings/income yield). This can be compared to the stock's market value to see if it is a bargain.

Lack of space in these minutes prohibits an exact description of the process, but it all seems to make sense and can be followed. Toward the end of the video, other calculated stock values are added, such as "Relative Safety," "Relative Timing," and "Master Indicator." for which somewhat less explanation is offered. Understanding all the con-

cepts and equations would take a lot of study but if one is willing to accept their validity, the VectorVest stock values can probably still be used effectively. The VectorVest program offers a lot of useful investment knowledge and we will probably be watching more of these training videos at future SIGs.

Until then, consider this bit of investment advice: "The popularly recommended buy and hold investment strategy is just an excuse not to have a well thought out exit plan."

Mac SIG—Lessons on Lion from Mac U Begin



We remembered Steve Jobs at the beginning of the Mac SIG meeting. Later Peter sent us a set of cartoons, one of which has Jobs, iPhone in hand, telling one of the angels that he has some ideas for improving communication on the other side.

We proceeded to tackle the features of the new operating system, Lion. Ray Jamroze and Peter Lee have installed Lion on their Macs; Dale Voit, Nancy Setloch and Julia Rice have not yet.

Nancy asked whether she needed a desktop computer. We told her that she can attach a monitor, printer and keyboard to her MacBook to make a small screen machine more easily used. Julia asked about a prohibition to keeping a laptop on all the time. Ray also advised that it should be turned off when not in use to prevent wearing out the machinery.

Ray then set us up to see Learn Mac OS X—Lion Edition from Mac U. As with our study of the Snow Leopard

OS, we began with Introduction to the Desktop. Some of this would be repetition. The Learn program has a sidebar to the left with two sections; the top tells how to run the program. The lower half is keyboard shortcuts and a pane to take notes. Click "Notes" to take a note. The divider can be dragged up or down. In this program, the user can rate each of the apps as it is used. One can communicate with the teacher through the program also.

Siri is the speech recognition feature in Lion. It came up in conversation. It has a conversational mode and, as such, is superior to Dragon Naturally Speaking. But it turns out that most of us prefer to do our own typing.

The Desktop. Which items will appear on the desktop can be changed. Finder preferences allow you to see all or few drives. There are several ways to open the Finder.

The MenuBar is always at the top. The Apple icon lists several basic commands, the most basic of which were explained. Others demand longer explanations and are a separate chapter.

The Finder is used to manage files and applications. "All my Files" can be displayed in outline form. There are various ways to view the files: by date last opened, by size, by arrangement of files. The green button resizes the folder to show all parts. There are other options that make the Finder functional to meet the user's needs. There is an Action button that gives more information about a file. Quick Look can be added with the customizing of the toolbar. The best way to use Quick Look is by just touching the spacebar when the file is highlighted.

We saw how to share files with another computer using Airdrop. There are Finder Preferences also: what window do you want to open? Personal preference controls the options. The spring-loaded folder option allows you to open a folder by holding a file on top of another folder. File extensions can be made visible by choice. There is a way to delete files securely. There is a search button in the Finder, separate from Spotlight, the main search engine.

View Options is another function. This controls the look of items on the desktop. Icon preview lets you see what is in a document instead of just an icon or folder. Custom colors can be assigned to finder windows. Some other options are the Status Bar at the bottom of the Finder window, telling how many documents are in a folder, or a path bar.

With a single click, a program can be opened from the Dock. Any program opened that is not permanently in the Dock will have an icon in the Dock

only while it is open. Some of the features are the same as in Snow Leopard, the previous operating system. "Lion is an evolutionary advance, not revolutionary," said Peter. Was he quoting somebody? Somebody important? Somebody already passed on? Ask him.

What should you do when your printer says service is required? Ray found a guy on the internet who has a program to cover the notice. The notice itself is a lure to a purchase.

The learning program marks the

items that have already been studied. The learner can go back over the topic, but will at least know the attempt is not new.

As a closer, we saw how to name the songs in iTunes when the only identification is the track number.

At the next meeting we will continue with the Learn program.

MS Excel SIG—Consolidating Worksheets, Examples



Although the Milwaukee Brewers were playing for NL championship, these events did not deter the following 6 members from attending the Microsoft (MS) Excel 2007 SIG on

Thursday October 13, 2011: Don Gardner, Tom Livermore, Richard Durand, Bill Gierach, Ted Torkelson, and Ginny Splinter.

Question #1 - Freeze Top Row

Tom asked how to freeze the top row when viewing a large worksheet with his list of Facebook Friends. In View tab and Workbook Views group, select Normal. In the Windows group, select Freeze Panes drop-down menu and Freeze Top Row. To return to the original status after usage, in the View tab, Windows group, and Freeze Panes drop-down menu, select Unfreeze Panes.

Question #2 - Create a Word Macro Shortcut

We also covered a Word question. Richard prepares minutes for several groups. First, he likes to type his alpha info. Next, he wants to select sentences in various parts of the write-up and have quotes added at the end of these sentences. Finally, he would like to have a shortcut key-stroke created to do this function. Richard should create a macro for

this function by Googling "Word Macro". Then he can create a short-cut keystroke for this function. This may take a few hours.

MS Word Smart Quotes

Definition - Microsoft created the term Smart Quotes to indicate angles quotes versus straight (vertical) quotes for both single and double quotes.

Publishing - In newspapers, magazines, and books, it is observed that Smart Quotes are used. This may be a standard.

Changing MS Word 2010 Defaults – If you wish to change any defaults in MS Word 2010, in File, Options, (On left) Proofing, AutoCorrect Options, select AutoFormat and AutoFormat As You Type tabs, and review the default checked options for Smart

Chapter 18 - Outlining Worksheets

Then we covered Chapter 18 - Outlining Worksheets. This creates an outlined worksheet with summary info which can be compressed. A "-" indicates you are viewing the details; a "+" indicates that there is hidden details. You can select the "-" or "+" and toggle between these 2 forms. This feature is nice to know if one wishes to use it. (See Example 2 for Outlined Worksheet).

Chapter 19 - Consolidating Worksheets

Next we covered Chapter 19 - Consolidating Worksheets. We used a workbook with monthly widgets sales for each of 4 regions. See Example 1 BEFORE Consolidation.

We created a new sheet. In the upper left corner we entered "Consolidated w Links". In the Data tab, and Data Tools group, select Consolidated. In the Consolidated window, and Function drop-down menu, select Add. In the worksheet tabs, select the first worksheet of North; then select all columns except the first column, and all rows except the bottom total row. In the Consolidate window and "All references:", select Add. Then select the

your Consolidated worksheet. The negative aspect is the Consolidated Worksheet w/ Links is created in the Outline form. This form is not desired if you want to total your columns, because you will have a mixture of summary and detailed info. See *Example 2 AFTER Consolidation w/ Links*.

2nd worksheet (East) and in the Consolidate window and "All references:", select Add. Repeat this process for the remaining 2 worksheets. In the bottom of the Consolidate window for "Use labels in:", check: Top Row, Left Column, and Create Links To Source Data, and OK. This latter check mark will automatically have any changes in the individual worksheets also updated

Internet SIG—Coping with Low Ink Notice, Printscreen

The WAUC Internet SIG for September 2011 was held on September 15th with about ten WAUC members attending. Richard Durand came directly from the visitation in West Bend for the long-time WAUC member we just lost, Mr. Glen Ehnert, and we took a little time to share our memories of him.

As usual, there were a lot of different computer issues raised at this SIG, not just email or internet issues. Bill Gierach, manning the keyboard, was able to make recommendations for almost everything asked. Some of the computer questions asked were as follows:

Dick Reinhard is using "Word 2003," and when he tries to open a saved file in this program he just gets a blank page. This might help. On the menu bar, go to Tools/Folder Options/File Types to bring up the "Open With" window and check the file type associations. To get to auto-backup copies, on the menu bar go to Tools/Options and select the "File Location" tab.

Ted Torkelsen said that sometimes he can't print a "Word" document in color though everything is set for color printing. Double check that all printer settings are correct and then try using a different USB cable to connect the printer.

Dolores Dettman is using "Outlook Express" and asked about how to get rid of the bars down the left side of forwarded emails. There was a lot of discussion about this but in the end, the easiest solution is to just copy and paste the message into a new email.

Ted Torkelsen had another issue. He got his computer with "MS Office XP" but he never activated it and yet he keeps getting pop ups announcing updates for this program. If the program has not been activated and is not being used, the best thing to do is to use the "Add/Remove Programs" selection in Windows "Control Panel" to uninstall it. Update

messages should not arrive if the application is no longer present.

Phil Walker said he often gets a message on the screen that the ink in the printer is low and then the printer just won't print. Again, check the printer settings. Phil said it was a Hewlett Packard printer so one can go to the forum page on the Hewlett Packard website, <http://www.hp.com/>, and see if anyone has



posted a question about this situation. Several members said that it's sometimes easier to just get a new printer. Sad but often true.

About this time, we were curious about the speed of our internet connection so Bill went to <http://www.speakeasy.net/speedtest/>. He checked the speed multiple times and got different results but generally the download speed was around 0.9 Mbps.

Bill kept going on the internet and showed us several interesting things. At the Hewlett Packard website, <http://www.hp.com/>, he showed us a color printer, the CP1025NW, now available for about \$300.00. Next, a very useful site for comparing computer hardware is "Tom's Hardware" at <http://www.tomshardware.com/>. To see what software has been updated, try this website; <http://www.filehippo.com/>.

Tom Livermore commented that the latest version of the computer cleanup application, Ccleaner, version 3.10.1525, available on this site, has new features, and is well worth getting.

Bill then demonstrated a very useful free program, also available at the Filehippo site, called "Solutio." This program shows what happens during bootup and enables one to make changes to speed up the process.

Before we left, Phil Walker asked where the "Printscreen" key is on a laptop because he can't find it on his. Every keyboard is different but it is on there somewhere. The important thing to remember is that hitting the printscreen key no longer automatically prints whatever is on the screen. Using this key actually only copies the computer screen to the clipboard, and this copy can then be pasted into an appropriate opened application, such as Windows "Paint," and from there the screen image can be printed.

And those were some of the computer issues dealt with at the WAUC Internet SIG for September 2011. To get help with your computer problems and to learn about using computers in general, take advantage of your membership and be sure to be at the next WAUC Internet SIG.

How to Recover Data from Dead Hard Drive

One of the most dreadful feelings that you can have is having a pc computer or laptop die that hadn't been backed up recently; especially if you have valuable pictures, music, videos, documents or other files on it.

In this Tech Tip we'll take a look at how to recover your valuable pictures from a dead computer.

Where to start

Computers are complex machines and when they work right, they are fun to use – but when something goes drastically wrong, it can feel as if your world crashed down around you. If your hard drive is still in working order, there is a very good chance that you'll be able to recover your pictures, music, videos and valuable documents (and other data) simply with another computer; a specialized cable, a screwdriver; and a little time.

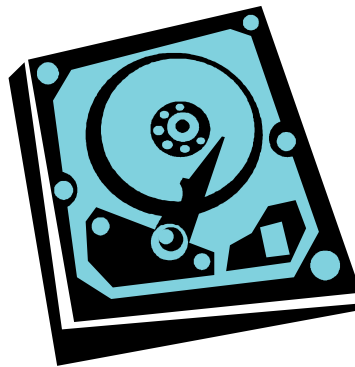
To start off, your best bet is to get a specialized USB cable that can plug directly into your hard drive that you'll recover from the dead computer. There are several types, and I'd recommend getting one that can handle both PATA (IDE) and SATA hard drives (the two most common used in consumer computers) as well as 2.5" (laptop) and 3.5" (desktop) hard drives (Geeks.com sells several that run in the \$13-16 range). You can also use a hard drive dock or external drive cases as well - but personally I find the specialized USB cable to be the easiest and most flexible option.

Next, remove the hard drive from the dead computer. On desktops it is usually held in with four Philips screwdrivers and on laptops it is usually under an access panel on the bottom of the computer. Remove any cables and caddies that the drive may have – all you need is the bare drive. Then plug in the USB cable into the hard drive (and a power cable if it is a desktop drive – also provided with the USB cable kit) and

then plug the other end of the USB cable into a working computer. The computer will then set up the drive as an external storage device and voilà! you'll now have access to the files on that drive (provided that the drive is not encrypted or using some type of security feature).

Where to look

OK, so the drive is now plugged into your computer and seen as an external drive, now what? You have several options. **One option is to simply look for the files on the drive from the dead computer that you plugged into the USB port and copy them onto the working computer. This is my preferred method personally.** I like to "brute force" my way through the drive with Windows Explorer (or a similar file browsing tool) and manually copy/paste the data from one computer to the other. Another option is to follow a Windows dialog box (that usually pops up when you plug in an external



drive) and have it help you copy your data from one computer to the other. If you are manually choosing to "brute force it" personal data is usually stored by default in the computers operating systems "home directory" for users.

Common Locations

for home directories (*where <root> takes the place of the drive letter*):

1. **Microsoft Windows 95-Me** `<root>\My Documents`
2. **Microsoft Windows 2000/XP/2003** `<root>\Documents and Set-`

`tings\<username>`
Microsoft Windows Vista / Windows 7 `<root>\Users\<username>`

Other "What ifs"

What if the files on the drives are erased? If they are, you can use a free recovery program such as Piriform's Recuva to look for and (hopefully) restore the files. This simple, easy-to-use tool is terrific for recovering pictures from a camera's memory card that have accidentally been erased as well!

What if the hard drive is the reason that the computer died (actual hardware failure)? If the hard drive is the part that caused the computer failure, then you may be out of luck. Yes, there are specialty recovery services that will pull apart the drives data platters and attempt to recover data (and they are usually successful - such services were used, for example, to recover data from the hard drives that were used on computers from the space shuttle Columbia after it broke apart in 2003) but such services are usually very expensive.

A word to the wise

Backup, backup, backup! Whether using one of the Internet based cloud services or a separate external hard drive – if you make it a habit of backing up regularly, chances are good that you'll keep the loss of such a failure to a minimum if a computer fails. Of course one of the benefits of using cloud-based backup services is that you can have access to your pictures anywhere you have Internet access.

Summing it up

A computer that dies can be a loss – but don't lose hope that your valuable pictures (and other stuff) are gone forever. With a little work, you can retrieve your data off the hard drives from a dead computer!

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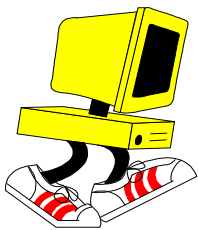
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
